## Why outdoor education offering is growing fast

The 23/24 academic year for Junction 16's Outdoor Education provision has been a period of exponential growth and opportunities for pupil's accessing the provision with implementation of bespoke programmes designed to support student social and emotional development.

These include the utilisation of our mobile climbing wall, various paddlesports skills and maintenance, mountain-biking skills and maintenance with our new fleet of high-end mountain bikes, staff training to enable access to the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award and enrichment-based exploration and pursuits in the 'great outdoors'.

Pupils across the RESPECT Collaboration of Schools (and external pupils) get the opportunity to experience these activities as well as develop a wide range of Bushcraft skills at their respective schools, at our Darley Barn site and also at our leased woodland site in the Staffordshire Peak District - thanks to close work with the Peak District National Park Authority (PDNPA) and the hard work and determination of our staff.

Nestled South of Buxton, The Hills Plantation is a 30-acre broadleaf woodland where pupils get the opportunity to further develop Bushcraft skills in a much more wild, natural and remote setting. This involves pupils putting their stamp on implementing and setting up their own pupil-centred 'camp' – i.e. area-clearing, development of long-term congregation areas and natural shelter, newly-created natural seating and much more.



Whilst on site, pupils are also responsible for setting up short-term hammocks, creating, maintaining and extinguishing a suitable fire and the typical tasks required to ensure all participants are warm and comfortable. In conjunction with the PDNPA's Wooded Landscapes Plan, pupils will also play a vital role in the regeneration and development of the woodland itself – utilising previously developed tool skills and developing additional bespoke skills.

The future is bright for Junction 16's Outdoor Education provision with the continued development of The Hills Plantation site, access to traditional outdoor climbing and mountain-biking/paddlesports further afield with the addition of a multi-purpose trailer to our fleet of vehicles – even more opportunities for our pupils to thrive and develop. It's never boring!
