





### Kingsmead School sports news

A group of pupils attended the Deaflympics at Aldercar School, collaborating with deaf and hard-of-hearing students, while KS3&4 pupils also took part in a local partnership event with Burton & South Derbyshire College, where BTEC Level 3/4 students planned and delivered a dodgeball coaching session. KS4 pupils are also working towards their BTEC Level 1 Introduction to Sport qualification, with Year 10 exploring post-16

pathways and developing dodgeball skills and Year 11 focusing on organisational and leadershp skills. KS3 pupils have built fundamental skills across invasion games including dodgeball, handball and basketball. Year 7 have also taken part in weekly cricket sessions with the Derbyshire Cricket Foundation and begun a new swimming programme, now embedded into the curriculum with support from Julie Shelton.









### Students fly high with aviation careers experience

Year 11 students from Castle School have been absolutely soaring this week as part of their Post-16, NTR and Careers activities, with a brilliant visit to the Aerozone at East Midlands Airport.

#### J16 students branch out for a greener future




Students at J16 Outdoor

The hazel collected will be recycled and put to good use for upcoming woodcraft projects and shelter building at the Darley Barn Education Centre.


FUN FACT: Hazel trees can live up to 80 years in a single growth, but when coppiced, they can survive for hundreds of years!
